## Visits to the Diocese

Over her long reign, Queen Elizabeth visited many parts of Newcastle Diocese including Newcastle Cathedral in 1990, when she visited the City with The Duke of Edinburgh to distribute the Royal Maundy money. A commemorative stone was laid to mark the occasion.

One of her early visits to Northumberland was to Holy Island in June 1958. It must have been quite an occasion for Islanders to see the Royal Yacht Britannia anchored off shore and the young Queen and Prince Phillip coming ashore on the Royal Barge. It was Sunday, so the Royal couple attended St Mary's Church for morning prayers before a tour of the Castle and Priory.

School girl Margaret Devine was lucky enough to be picked to present the Queen with a bowl made from Holy Island clay. Margaret and the other school children were each given smaller replica bowls, something she has kept and treasured along with the order of service. Margaret fondly remembers the visit saying: "Seeing me present the bowl to the Queen made my parents proud. It was a wonderful day for Holy Island."

In 1977, Queen Elizabeth arrived in Newcastle on The Royal Yacht Britannia for her Silver Jubilee Tour. She met children at Cramlington High School and officially opened Eldon Square.

Other visits to the Diocese included the official opening of the Tyne Tunnel in 1967, the opening of the new Metro line to Gateshead in 1981, the opening of Kielder Water in 1982, The Tall Ship's Race in 1986, and a visit to Alcan, Lynemouth and Newcastle Racecourse in 1993. In 2002, as part of the Golden Jubilee Tour, she rode the Tyne and Wear Metro and opened the Millennium Bridge. She returned to Newcastle in 2009, when she met people on a walkabout on Northumberland Street.

## Bishop Mark joined other faith leaders to lead tributes to the Queen at the Great North Run

Although other events across the country were cancelled following the death of Her Majesty the Queen, the GNR went ahead in tribute to Her Majesty's life and service. A few minutes before the start of the main race, Bishop Mark delivered a poignant message on behalf of local faith leaders, a tribute to The Late Queen Elizabeth II from the starting line. After a prayer, a one minute's silence was kept before the crowds sang an emotional chorus of the national anthem, God Save The King.

### Bishop Mark's Great North Run message and prayers

"This morning, we meet together in a world that has changed profoundly in a matter of days. Rarely has one life touched so many of us and so deeply: defining who we are, inspiring who we might be and uniting us as a nation and a people. We stand together here today in testimony of that unity and our common purpose for the common good of all.

"Most of us have never known our nation, our world, or even our own lives without

the constant, consistent and gracious presence of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. In so many ways, her life and faith fulfil the words of Scripture: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith."

"Today, we run this race as a tribute to Her Majesty's life and service, in that same spirit of love and dedication to those in need which has marked her long reign. Whoever you are, whatever your faith or background, let's run the race and keep the faith."

# The Dean of Newcastle announces his retirement



**T**HE Very Revd Geoff Miller, Dean of Newcastle, has announced that he will retire in November. The Dean recently oversaw a major refurbishment of the cathedral, still formally known as the Cathedral Church of St Nicholas, which serves as the mother church of the Diocese of Newcastle. The redevelopment involved a programme of capital works beginning in February 2020, funded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund.

The Cathedral reopened in summer 2021 with a new interpretation scheme, improved disabled access, and a landscaped outdoor terrace. Since reopening, the building has hosted a wide range of Diocesan and civic events, with several significant services for the period of National Mourning.

Reflecting on his time, Geoff said: "It has been a joy to play a part in the continuing story of the Cathedral, helping to make this sacred place common ground."

"The vision we have created together has driven us to offer a radical welcome, inspiring worship and encounters that empower worth in each other. Even more important than the fabric of the building are the people; that is the incredible staff and volunteers, my talented clergy colleagues, and a vibrant congregation."

"We have benefited from a strong team, committed to a common vision."

The Acting Bishop of Newcastle and Bishop of Berwick, the Right Reverend Mark Wroe, paid tribute to Geoff: "Over the last four years, Geoff has served both Newcastle Cathedral and the people of the city and diocese with

passion and commitment as Dean of Newcastle, and before that the wider Diocese since 1999, including his role as Archdeacon of Northumberland from 2005.

"Through the 'Common Ground in Sacred Space' project, which secured multi-million-pound Heritage Lottery funding, Geoff has overseen the incredible transformation of our Cathedral into an inspirational place to visit and worship in the heart of Newcastle and a building that is fit for future generations. His consistent compassion for the most vulnerable in our society and his desire to work closely with other churches and faiths, and city institutions and businesses, has ensured the Cathedral plays a key role in city life."

"Geoff leaves a legacy that is inspiring. He retires with our deep gratitude for his friendship, wisdom and for all that he has given this Diocese. We keep him and his wife Elaine in our prayers and love as they prepare to enter this new stage of life."

The Dean's time has encompassed the Covid 19 lockdowns, during which the Cathedral was an early adopter of live-streamed services, reaching new and existing members of the congregation while the building remained closed to worship.

Born and bred in the council estate of Wythenshawe in Manchester, Geoff had a short career in teaching at secondary level in Leeds before he began training for ministry at Nottingham. He was ordained in 1983 and served his title in the Parish of Jarrow.

There followed parish responsibilities in Billingham, South Shields, Stockton-on-Tees

and Darlington before moving to Newcastle Cathedral as a Residentiary Canon and Diocesan Urban Officer in 1999.

In 2005 Geoff became Archdeacon of Northumberland, remaining attached to the Cathedral until becoming Acting Dean in 2018. He was installed as the Dean of Newcastle in the following year and in this capacity, has served the community in a wide variety of civic roles.

Geoff said: "Throughout the years, I have received so much undeserved support and genuine affection and hopefully played a small part in the extension of the Kingdom of God."

"My prayers and good wishes will be with the Diocese as it prepares to welcome a new Bishop and of course with the Cathedral as it continues to enhance and enjoy its ministry in the region."

The Dean's last formal service at Newcastle Cathedral will be the 4pm Choral Evensong on Sunday 20 November with a farewell reception afterwards. The process of appointing a new Dean of Newcastle will likely begin in the New Year, with an Acting Dean to be appointed in the interim.

The Dean will host 'The Dean's Farewell Tours' on select dates in October and November. At these events, the Dean will accompany visitors around Newcastle Cathedral, pointing out some of his favourite features in a building he has come to know so well. In the last few weeks we have seen extraordinary and touching scenes as our nation, and the world, begins to come to terms with the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. For many of us it has been one more seismic change in a world that shows no sign of letting us get used to anything we might call 'back to normal'.

In what has turned out to be the longest period of service, through decades of extraordinary change and turbulence in society and the world, Elizabeth our Queen strengthened, inspired and united us by her love for her people and by her faith and trust in God.

I believe that 'God save the Queen' has been a prayer that God has faithfully answered graciously, nobly, victoriously, happily and gloriously for 70 years. When I spoke at the Cathedral's Commemoration Service for Her Late Majesty, I quoted one commentator who noted: 'there can be few greater indications of God's mercy and grace to our nation... than to have given us a Queen who loved us so faithfully and pointed us to him so clearly.'

A new Prime Minister and a new Monarch in the space of two days is a rate of change that risks taking our breath away. And we know that with all the economic and environmental challenges we face, change and turmoil will only continue. While it feels like one absolute constant has been stripped away from us, our Queen's vocation was to point us, again and again, to what endures, and moreover, to who endures: her King and Lord, Jesus Christ.

As we pray for our new King and for our nation, and as we brace for more change and challenge, let's remember our true constant, our rock, our firm foundation: Jesus Christ our Cornerstone.

**"As Christian adopters, we wanted to provide unconditional parental love"**

Adopt North East is a Regional Adoption Agency, responsible for family-finding for children in this area who cannot be raised in their first family.

Children are waiting today for a loving, forever family. Children of all ages, needs and backgrounds, and brothers and sisters who want to live together.

Adopt North East was formed in 2018 to provide adoption services on behalf of Newcastle, South Tyneside, Northumberland, North Tyneside and Gateshead Councils. Since then, it has found hundreds of forever families for children and supported over a thousand adoptive families.

A couple who adopted recently have shared their thoughts on how their Christian faith has supported and guided them on their adoption journey: "We found the Adopt North East process from introduction meetings through to matching panel considered and positive to our faith. We confidently made our trust in Jesus known at our first meeting with Adopt North East and this was welcomed and not made an obstacle.

"During the assessment process we discussed our faith at length with our allocated social worker and although we were challenged by some questions, on reflection we found this really helpful and



these discussions gave us clarity and focus on what we as Christian adopters wanted to provide – unconditional parental love, no matter what, as our adoptive Father provides us.

"We had a positive experience with Adopt North East through training, assessment and matching and would recommend to other Christians considering the adoption process."

Regardless of whether you live in the North East or not, whether you are working or not, own or rent your home, are single, married or in a partnership, Adopt North East would love to hear from you. All applications are welcome, regardless of gender identity, sex,

disability, race, religion or sexual orientation.

# St Mary's Bee and Bug Hotel, Longframlington

ON 31 August, Longframlington Baby and Toddler Group carried out a bug hotel build within the church grounds, providing a fantastic sensory experience and opportunity to learn about nature.

My partner and I worked together to design and construct the frame, made from off-cuts of good quality wood, which were destined for the skip. The bee section needed to be between 1.5 and 2m from the ground, in a sheltered, sunny spot with a south or south-west facing. The position of the hotel would be visible from both sides, providing greater access for the bugs but also a larger viewing area. It needed to be fairly quick and easy to fill, to help retain the attention of young children.

The hotel is split into seven sections and painted with the colours of the rainbow. The colours help attract and direct children's attention but also help show what bugs might be found where.

The central green box was inspired by a rogue caterpillar who got into my home and changed into a chrysalis in one of the ridges of my downstairs toilet door. The wood fixed into this section has ridges cut into it so hopefully caterpillars will find it a safe place to become chrysalis. It may also appeal to lacewings.

The yellow box is designed to attract the attention of the docile, solitary masonry bee, while the dead leaves and twigs of the red box should attract beetles and spiders. The dead heads of the sunflowers, which the toddler group planted at Easter contributed to the filling of the pink box and earwigs were spotted while filling this section. The lower

blue and orange boxes contain the heavier rocks and rotting logs respectively, primarily for weight distribution and stability. However, being lower in the hotel will help contribute to the cooler, damper micro-habitats these materials will create.

On the official day of the build, local children and adults worked together to fill the frame and community members joined us to chat about what we were doing, and it was all very well received.

It was a delight to hear such enthusiastic little voices and observe their reactions, especially when we had bugs trying to move in before we'd even finished.

The name and age of each child who took part was written into the frame in permanent marker, a fitting reminder of their contribution to this church led community conservation project.

OVER the last year or so I've had the privilege of working with North Tyneside Council in respect of their Bereavement and Loss Support Programme. As a result, we ran two Death Cafés from our church building and those who attended found them extremely helpful and a positive way to talk about both life and death. A number of prayer requests came from these events. I'd be happy to talk to anyone who would like to organise their own Death Café.

A further tranche of the programme was the planning and development of the Reflection and Contemplation Areas along the North Tyneside Wagonway. I was invited to attend the opening of the Central Compass at Silverlink Biodiversity Park on 23 March, which commemorated the second anniversary of the Covid lockdown.

I was thrilled when my suggestion of including a Prayer Box was accepted and the first Prayer Box has been installed at Wallsend. What an honour it was to say a prayer and officially launch this Prayer Box at Wallsend Memorial Hall grounds on 11 July. The opening events had

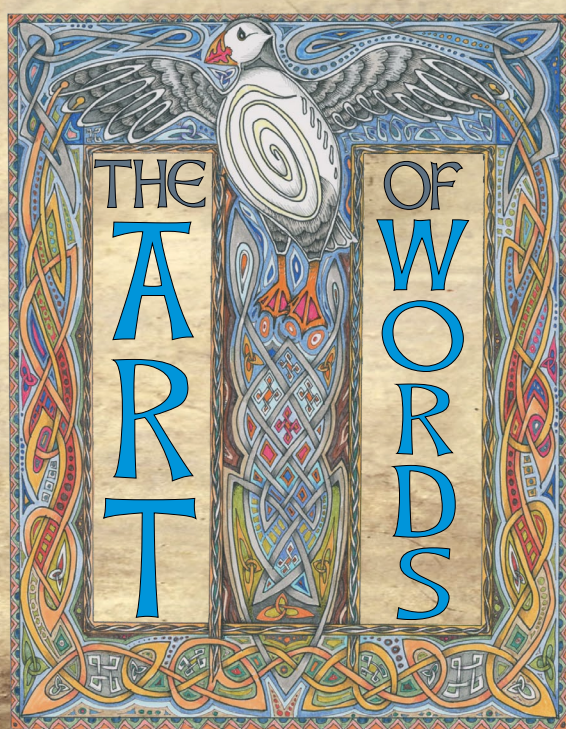
a tremendous feeling of partnership and community, all held by prayer. They involved local school children, residents and organisations and it's great that, locally, the wider Church is involved too, with input from Fr John Vilaseca (St Paul's, Whitley Bay) and Revd Sarah Moon (St John's, Killingworth).

There are five areas of reflection and contemplation in North Tyneside designed as places where people can visit to remember loved ones they tragically lost during the pandemic, as well as offering a space to reflect on the impact that the pandemic has had on us all. These commu-

nity spaces also help us to remember the ways in which people and our communities came together to support one another. The five compasses are connected by the wagonways, helping to encourage healthy walks in North Tyneside as we reflect and pray.

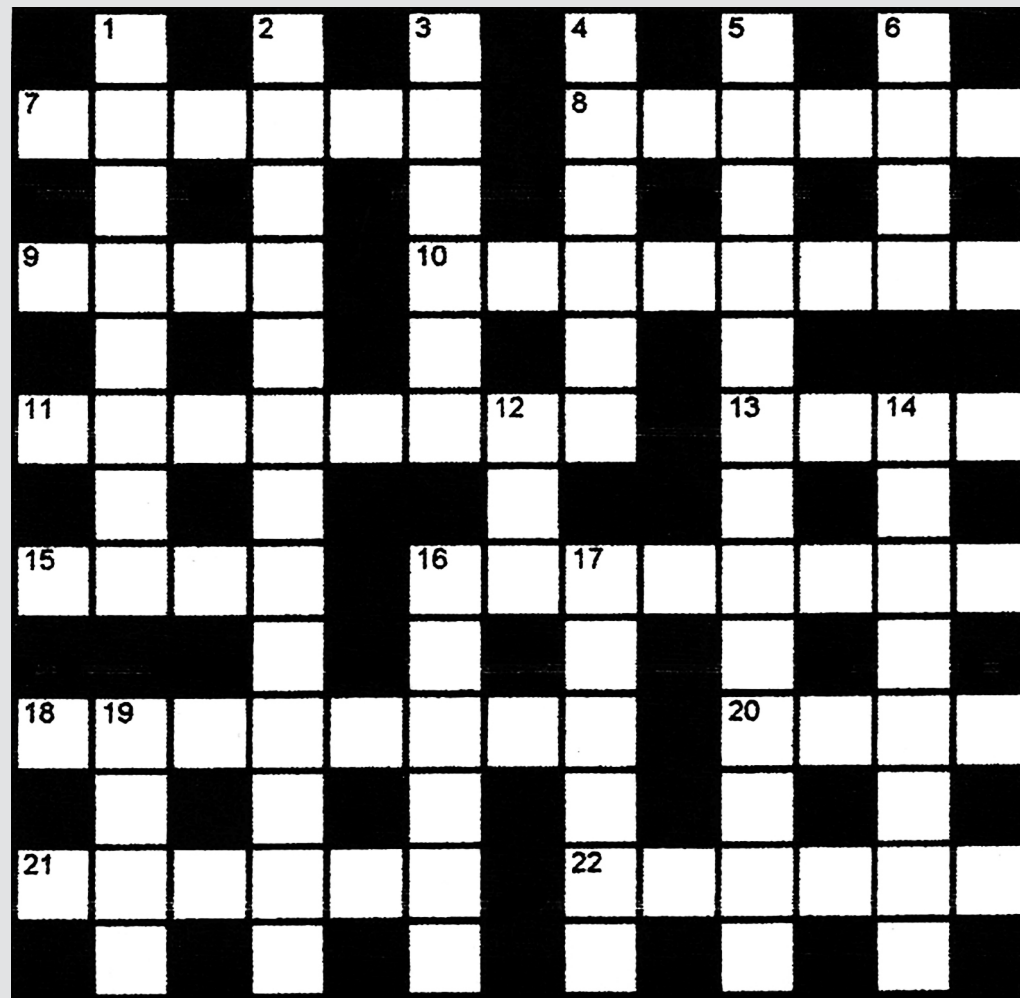

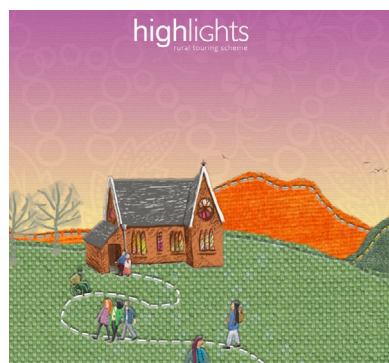

## Norwegian Inspiration

A speaking tour of Norway in July included giving two talks at churches on the pilgrim route from Oslo to Trondheim in our link diocese of Møre and at Alesund.

I discussed the evolving nature of retreats with friends at Lia Guard and Sandon retreat houses and spoke at a series of pilgrim events celebrating the arrival of Irish Princess Saint Sunniva, who sailed (perhaps from Shetland) to Norway's Selja Island in the 10th century, and died with her sisters entombed in rocks rather than allow themselves to be raped by Vikings. Centuries before the top-down conversion to state Christianity under King Olaf, the sweet scent from the bones of these Celtic martyrs attracted many to the way of Jesus.

The Commune Selje organised a two-day pilgrim conference where I spoke about Celtic Christianity and re-weaving the

separated God-given strands of Christianity, and gave a homily on Christ's gentle mother's milk associated with Aidan of Lindisfarne and Sunniva, and the role of holy islands in the future of Christianity. In the afternoon five people in CAH vows (those who take vows to follow the new monastic Way of Life of The Community of Aidan and Hilda) joined a boatload on the island, and a video was made of me praying aloud in the candlelit cave, which people call the womb of Norway's church.

I was the guest speaker at a prayer and prophecy conference organised by Youth With A Mission and prayer networks on Celtic Christianity – the way forward for today's Norway. They asked me to speak about Celtic Ways of Praying. The USA prophetic film maker Carl Wesley Anderson of Born to Blaze Ministries, who was filming with Brother Cassian on Holy Island the following week, was there and asked me to join in a day's filming on Celtic angel experiences.



**FOR THE LOVE OF COLOUR**

I was sitting in the coffee bar in a motorway service station overlooking the motorway just idly watching the traffic stream past. Suddenly, there was a splash of bright green. It reminded me of catching a glimpse of a kingfisher – a real treat. The streaming traffic continued – greys, silvers, blues, dull greens and reds. Then came another blast of bright green. I started looking out for bright greens, searching for the next dash of colour in an otherwise dull drive-past.

Isn't it wonderful how a colour can shift and lift our mood? Conversely, have you noticed that we can shift and lift our mood by choosing to wear a colour that we love?

I often notice the colours people wear and how the colours they choose change as their mood changes. I have seen people dressed exclusively in greys and blacks, deep blues and greens slowly, over time, start to include small splashes of colour. At the same time their facial expressions change from still to mobile and they smile more readily. Their posture unfreezes and they start to move with ease. Their voice changes from slow and monotone to buoyant and rhythmic.

I look out for the introduction of colour in what they choose to wear; to me it represents a Spring-like change in their sense of self. And that colour, like the bright green cars in an otherwise dull palette, gives me hope on their behalf; hope that change is happening.
