


### **Making Room Around Tables**

#### Attending to God in our Scriptures

BLESSED Lord, who hast caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning; Grant that we may in such wise hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that by patience and comfort of thy holy Word, we may embrace, and ever hold fast, the blessed hope of everlasting life, which thou hast given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

This collect or gathering prayer includes five verbs that exhort us to attend to God in the scriptures we hear and speak whether we are in service, at home, or journeying. They are not passive words, each one has a discernible activity that can enable us to look for God's working through God's word:



What do we notice in the text when we hear a Bible passage read aloud?



What do we notice in the text when we read a Bible passage repeatedly?



How might we 'make a mark' of what the passage is underlining in our lives?



We might memorise a meaningful passage or ask us? How might God for the space to talk about it.



What verses have taken deep roots in other verses join them?



### Attending to God in each Place

The Benedicite

All of creation's primary task is praise of the Lord, not serving the interests of human creatures. As human creatures, it's our job to attend to and amplify that praise rather than get in its way. Our tradition offers this in the form of a said or sung prayer, of which there are longer and briefer versions. It might help us attend to God in a greater range of places or enable us to add our own venues in which God's blessing is discerned.

Bless the Lord all you works of the Lord: sing his praise and exalt him for ever. Bless the Lord you heavens: sing his praise and exalt him for ever. Bless the Lord you angels of the Lord: sing his praise and exalt him for ever. Bless the Lord all people on earth: sing his praise and exalt him for ever. O people of God bless the Lord: sing his praise and exalt him for ever. Bless the Lord you priests of the Lord: sing his praise and exalt him for ever. Bless the Lord you servants of the Lord: sing his praise and exalt him for ever.

Signs of Hope?




Signs of Faith?
